Tough Jobs

What was the toughest task/job/repair you've



ever done to your LBC? For me, it probably was removing and reinstalling the heater box in my 1977 MGB

Fortunately, the engine was out of the car, and the bonnet removed. Otherwise, there just would not have been room to access the heater box because I had to stand in the engine compartment to do the job. Compounding the tight fit are the flex pipes and control cables that snake into the car to feed warm air into the cockpit and to the demisters. Once you succeed in getting the assembly started moving

upward out of its opening, you, then have to figure out how to get the heater box to clear the edge of the car's body (scuttle) - the heater has to be lifted straight up, yet still has to tilt forward near the top of the lift - it has to be in two places at the same time.

That was one of those jobs that when it got



done I couldn't tell you what made it happen, it just happened - there must have been some magic involved.

Alternately, putting the damn thing back in may be even harder. That job also relied on a bunch of magic (while colorful magic words were uttered). Getting the control cables fed down through the scuttle and into the cockpit requires at least three loooong, skinny arms - don't get

those cables pinched or the heater or the demister can't be turned on/off and controlled.



Oh, yes, that new inch thick

foam gasket makes the entire assembly far too fat, tall, and unwieldy to go into it's opening. Maybe it would have been easier if the brake lines weren't already in place.

Bear in mind, this was done with a freshly painted car. No scratches or gouges allowed!

Believe it, or not, I was reduced to spraying the opening and the heater box with cooking oil as a lubricant.

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After a long, long struggle, suddenly and without warning, there was a soft floomp and the heater box was in place, only needing to be bolted down and the cockpit parts attached.
